

CROP SURVEY ON QUEBECERS' MATERIALS RECOVERY HABITS IN PUBLIC PLACES

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In an effort to respond to their citizens' environmental concerns, an increasing number of municipal organizations are installing materials recovery equipment in public places, including parks, arenas, libraries, sports centres and along commercial streets. In its role as the organization that represents companies who put packaging on Quebec's market and finances municipal curbside recycling programs in the province, Éco Entreprises Québec (ÉEQ) also contributes to ensuring that a maximum of recyclables are recovered.

Given that the costs of municipal services are compensated with the contributions ÉEQ pays every year in compliance with the Environment Quality Act, ÉEQ wishes to improve materials recovery both at home and in public places via its various programs and initiatives.

As one of its programs, equally financed by ÉEQ and the Government of Quebec via the Fonds vert, is specifically designed to encourage the installation of materials recovery in public places by reimbursing municipalities for a significant part of equipment costs, ÉEQ wished to gauge Quebecers' attitudes towards recycling when they are away from home.

In the first survey of its kind conducted in two stages, specifically in December 2015 and January 2016, ÉEQ and CROP Inc. asked Quebecers about their knowledge and especially their habits when it comes to materials recovery in public places.

HIGHLIGHTS

Use of materials recovery equipment outside the home

Good news! It appears that Quebecers continue to recycle even when they are away from home. According to survey results, equipment provided in public places is often used by citizens who wish to dispose of a container, packaging or printed matter. Indeed, when a recycling bin is available in a public place, 83% of respondents always use it, 15% occasionally use it and only 2% never or rarely use it.

To further encourage the trend, respondents think more equipment should be installed, as three out of four respondents (74%) all over the province say that they would recycle materials more often if the recovery equipment were available in public places.

1. Use of materials recovery equipment outside the home

Province-wide, 83% of respondents always dispose of their recyclables in recovery equipment if a bin is available in the public place they are in, while 15% do so only occasionally.

Residents in Outaouais are most likely to recycle materials when they are away from home, with 93% of residents saying that they always do so when bins are available.

Province-wide, the places where materials recovery equipment is most used are shopping centres, parks, workplaces and along commercial streets. There are some differences outside major urban centres, where people tend to recycle less when they are near bus shelters and metro exits. On the other hand, people in the regions recycle more when they are inside or outside arenas than do large city dwellers.

Province-wide, the item that is most often placed in recycling bins outside the home is the water bottle. The ranking of other items varies according to the region. For example, fast food containers are seldom recycled in Montréal and Québec CMAs, while such containers rank much higher on the scale in Bas-St-Laurent, Saguenay-Lac-St-Jean and Outaouais.



4. Behaviour when no recycling bins are available in public places

When recycling bins are not readily available, over two-thirds of Quebecers avoid putting recyclables in the trash can, instead making an effort to look further for a bin or taking it home for appropriate disposal.

In Saguenay-Lac-St-Jean, the proportion of people who bring the recyclable home reaches 49%, or 9% higher than the provincial average.

Almost three-quarters of Quebecers think there are too few recycling bins available in public places. An even greater proportion of Outaouais residents (82%) say that there aren't enough recycling bins available.

According to 61% of respondents province-wide, more pieces of recovery equipment should be installed in parks, while a good proportion of Mauricie residents (66%) wished for more recycling bins along commercial streets.



METHODOLOGY

Questions on recycling habits were included in a CROP Inc. omnibus survey conducted online in two stages, i.e. in December 2015 and January 2016. A total of 1,412 questionnaires were completed.

Results were weighted to reflect Quebec's adult population according to respondents' sex, age, region of residence, mother tongue and level of education. A series of questions from our broad annual Panorama study (formerly known as 3SC) on values were also added to the questionnaire. That allowed us to weigh the sample according to respondents' personal values from a probability sample.

Given the nonprobability sample of the web survey, the calculation of the margin of error does not apply.

^{*}These areas are not part of municipal public places and are therefore not eligible for the financial assistance program designed to help municipalities purchase away-from-home materials recovery equipment.
